A MESSAGE FROM...

Dear Friends,

Most everyone reading this, I would hope, owns a bible. Some people reading this, however, may have been formed in their childhood to think that reading the bible is a dangerous task best left to the clergy. Nonsense, says the Second Vatican Council. (I'm paraphrasing.)



No doubt opening the Bible can be intimidating. We're inundated with words, places, names, and events that seem so unintelligible, remote, strange, or fantastic. Obviously, we don't need to memorize them or even pronounce them correctly. We don't have to worry about catching everything or doing things "right" the first few times around. It's a life's journey.

Think about it as moving into a new house. Masons, plumbers, electricians, etc. have taken the time to construct a well-designed house. When you set foot in it the first time, you're not expecting a fully furnished and cozy place, are you? That takes work. You've got to get to know the house and use your imagination. Only after some time and some heavy lifting are you able to say that the place feels like home. As you walk through the front door day after day and year after year and as you continue to form important memories there at home, you come to know the house like the back of your hand.

So it can be with the Scriptures. The mansion of the Bible has been built by many different hands and has even been lived in by many people throughout history. But it's our turn to move in, if we haven't already, and make ourselves at home.

Lent 2021, which begins in less than a week, can be the perfect time for you to move in and get comfortable. To that end, I'm pleased to announce one simple daily offering to you this Lent. It's called Biblical Fitness (in hommage to Fr. Matt!). Biblical Fitness is a Lenten regimen that involves reading through one book of the Bible (Mark for "lightweights" and Exodus for "heavyweights"). Beginning on the First Sunday of Lent, I'll be sending a daily email with a short reflection or observation that might help address typical questions about the passage or may offer some other little insight. The Stations of the Cross began as the practice of pious pilgrims to Jerusalem who would retrace the final journey of Jesus Christ to Calvary. Later, for the many who wanted to pass along the same route, but could not make the trip to Jerusalem, a practice developed that eventually took the form of the fourteen stations currently found in almost every church. - USCCB

ASH WEDNESDAY CHANGES THIS LENT

As we heard in our Epiphany Proclamation, we will celebrate Ash Wednesday on February 17, 2021. It is the beginning of the Lenten season and the beginning of the 40 days we are to spend mirroring Jesus' journey in the desert. On Ash Wednesday, we normally come to receive ashes on our foreheads and follow the command to repent and believe in the Gospel.

This year Ash Wednesday might feel a bit different than our "usual" Ash Wednesdays. Due to Covid - 19 the Archdiocese and the entire Church has had to adapt and change what we have become accustomed to in our ways of worshipping. Below are the details for how Ash Wednesday has been adapted to maintain the safety of all who worship:

Distribution of ashes is to be done in the following way:

"After blessing the ashes and sprinkling them with holy water in silence, the priest addresses those present, reciting once the formula found in the Roman Missal: 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel' or 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.' Without saying anything, he then sprinkles ashes on the top of people's heads rather than using them to make a cross on people's foreheads..."

Sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads, rather than marking foreheads with ashes, is the customary practice at the Vatican and in Italy. Given the spread of the coronavirus, the practice has the advantage of not requiring the priest to touch multiple people. The beauty is that as a whole Church, we will be receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday. We are all connected through our frailty and can find redemption through the One who helps us to conquer our sin and gives us that opportunity for eternal life with him. This Ash Wednesday let us be reminded that no matter how our ashes are received, we have a God who is seeking a relationship with us and wants us to know his love. Let us use this upcoming Lent to focus on the God who is pursuing us and how we can better prepare our hearts to share his love with others.

Important Reminders for Ministers of Care

At St. James we are blessed to serve God in so many ways; one is as a Minister of Care! MOC, as it is informally known, is women and men of the parish who bring Holy Communion, prayer, and conversation to the sick, the shut in, or those otherwise unable to attend Mass.

People sometimes ask if a Eucharistic Minister and a Minister of Care are the same. While both have the privilege and sacred trust to offer Jesus in Holy Communion, the training and function are different. The Eucharistic Minister is trained to offer Holy Communion at Mass or during a prayer service. A Minister of Care is a pastoral presence to those in hospital, care residences, or homebound. An MOC has twelve hours of required Archdiocesan training to become mandated as Ministers of Care and as Eucharistic Ministers.

For the duration of the COVID pandemic, specific Sacramental Guidelines have been provided by the Archdiocese in regard to MOC visits. If you did NOT receive these guidelines last spring via email, it may be that you are not on the roster as an MOC. It is important that the parish has an up-to-date list of ministers and those to whom they minister. Especially in these COVID times, an accurate accounting facilitates contact tracing which is essential to keep everyone safe. Please let me know if you did NOT receive the Guidelines so that I can add you to the MOC roster.

One important guideline, for current use, is in regard to the pyx. For each household visited on a single day, a separate, sanitized pyx is to be used. This is to avoid cross-contamination between households. Of course, masking, sanitizing before and after entering a home and distributing Holy Communion, distancing except at distribution, and brief visits are also part of the Guidelines for now.

Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. Six Black Catholics are featured in <u>On the Road to Sainthood: Leaders of African Descent</u> <u>USCCB</u>. Two of these Black American Catholics who are being considered for sainthood are Father Augustus Tolton and Sister Thea Bowman.



Father Augustus Tolton, a former slave, was born in Missouri in 1854. Augustus Tolton applied to seminaries across the country with the help of an Irish priest he had been studying with in Illinois. No seminary would accept him because he was black, so he instead had to

study in Rome, where he was eventually ordained in 1886.

He served mainly in the Quincy, IL and Chicago areas, helping the poor and sick, feeding the hungry and winning souls for God. His endless, tireless and devoted work led many to the Faith. In 1897, the first black Catholic priest in America, lovingly known as "Good Father Gus," died unexpectedly while on a priest's

retreat. Tolton was only 43 years old, yet he left a legacy that will live forevermore. <u>Learn more about Father Tolton</u>





Sister Thea Bowman, born in 1937 in Mississippi, was reared as a Protestant until at age nine when she asked her parents if she could become a Catholic.

Gifted with a brilliant mind, beautiful voice and a dynamic personality, Sister Thea shared the message of God's love through a teaching career. After 16 years of teaching, at the elementary, secondary and university level, the bishop of Jackson, Mississippi, invited her to become the consultant for intercultural awareness.

In her role as consultant Sister Thea gave presentations across the country; lively gatherings that

combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer and storytelling. Her programs were directed to break down racial and cultural barriers. She encouraged people to communicate with one another so that they could understand other cultures and races. Sister Thea is credited with originating the phrase "Black is Beautiful", which she borrowed from her mother.

Diagnosed with cancer, she prayed "to live until I die." Her prayer was answered, and Sister Thea continued her gatherings seated in a wheelchair. In 1989, the U.S. bishops invited her to be a key speaker at their conference on Black Catholics. At the end of the meeting, at Sister Thea's invitation, the bishops stood and sang "We Shall Overcome" with gusto. She died in 1990.


Our goal is to create a safe place for those living with or those caring for someone with mental health concerns to come together to pray and share with one another.


