The early Church often seems to be idyllic. After all, believers shared generously and were "of one heart and mind," Acts 4:32 tells us. But even in great communities, cracks start surfacing over time. One sad fracture manifests itself in Acts 6, when the Aramaic-speaking believers are said to be neglecting the Greek-speaking believers' needs. Church leadership mends the fracture first by paying attention to it and then appointing ministers who can respond appropriately to the needs of the Greek-speakers and thus work toward greater unity.

This scene can help us to draw attention to those in our own community who have had similar experiences as the Greek-speakers of Acts 6.

Last year, as a follow-up to a discussion on racism and racial justice, several of our own Peace & Justice members sat down for individual conversations with 23 parishioners of color who call St. James home. The purpose was to understand their perspectives on how they serve and are served by this community of believers and to take note of any blind spots. (Actually, what they did was a good preview of what the Synod aims to do!)

It's wonderful to report that not a single person in the discussion had experienced conscious, deliberate racism at St. James—something to be celebrated. But there's another form of racism, often called systemic racism, that is different and displayed indirectly, unconsciously, or institutionally. Much like the scene in Acts 7, this second form of racism doesn't take the form of hurling a racial slur directly or posting a sign saying "this group is not allowed" or the like. Rather, it is more like a sin of omission or a blind spot—where we fail to notice (or fail to act upon

noticing) our participation in a situation that is unjustly benefiting us and disadvantaging another because of his or her race (and likewise culture, language, gender, age, etc.).

Half of the people in the Peace & Justice conversations reported that they've experienced this second type of racism here at St. James in various ways. Some cited examples of being friended on Facebook (easy enough) only to be ignored when gathering in person before or after liturgies. Others saw email chains containing racist jokes, stereotypes, or misinformation circulated among ministry groups without anyone respectfully calling it out, which can be deemed a form of tacit approval.

Other examples exist, and certainly they exist outside of St. James as well. Some may not view these to be issues, and some might excuse them as just part of life. But for those who have experienced them, they seem to be fractures that have the potential to be mended with authentic Christian love.

Imagine if the Twelve had never listened to the experience of the Greek-speakers or had tried to justify the injustice done to them. The Church might look a lot different…and all of us who don't speak Aramaic might find ourselves to be on the margins.

If we listen to the Spirit as the believers in Acts did, we might find ways to improve our own sight so we can notice, welcome, and help others and watch the community grow in number and in love.




In Religious Ed class, our First Graders learned about their Catholic identity.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH BLACK CATHOLIC CANDIDATES FOR CANONIZATION

Six Black Americans are underway in their cause for canonization



Father Augustus Tolton (1854 – 1897) a former slave, was born in Missouri. Augustus Tolton applied to seminaries across the country with the help of an Irish priest he had been studying with in Illinois. No seminary would accept him because he was black, so he instead had to study in Rome, where he was eventually ordained in 1886.


He served mainly in the Quincy, IL and Chicago areas, helping the poor and sick, feeding the hungry and winning souls for God. His endless, tireless and devoted work led many to the Faith. In 1897, the first black Catholic priest in America, lovingly known as "Good Father Gus," died unexpectedly while on a priest's retreat. Tolton was only 43 years old, yet he left a legacy that will live forevermore.



Sister Thea Bowman (1937 – 1990) born in Mississippi, was reared as a Protestant until at age nine when she asked her parents if she could become a Catholic. After 16 years of teaching, at the elementary, secondary and university level, the bishop of Jackson, Mississippi, invited her to become the consultant for intercultural awareness. Sister Thea gave presentations across the country; lively gatherings that combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer and storytelling. Her programs were directed to break down racial and cultural barriers. Sister Thea is credited with originating the phrase "Black is Beautiful", which she borrowed from her mother.

Diagnosed with cancer, she prayed "to live until I die." In 1989, the U.S. bishops invited her to be a key speaker at their conference on Black Catholics. At the end of the meeting, at Sister Thea's invitation, the bishops stood and sang

"We Shall Overcome" with gusto.



After his marriage in 1811 to Juliette Noel, Toussaint and his wife opened their home as an orphanage, employment bureau, and a refuge for travelers. He also contributed funds and helped raise money to build Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Mulberry Street. He was a benefactor of the first New York City Catholic school for Black children at St. Vincent de Paul on Canal Street.

Because of Toussaint's reputation of great charity, Cardinal Terence Cooke, then Archbishop of New York, and his successor, Cardinal John O'Connor, strongly supported Toussaint for sainthood. Toussaint is the first layperson to be buried in the crypt below the main altar of Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth Avenue, generally reserved for bishops of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York. In 1996, he was declared Venerable by Pope John Paul II.



Mother Henriette Díaz DeLille, SSF (1813 – 1862) was a Black Catholic nun from New Orleans who founded the Sisters of the Holy Family in 1836 and served as their first Mother Superior.

DeLille became an outspoken opponent of plaçage, in which generally young, French or European-American men had extended relationships or common-law marriages with free women of color. The men often later married "white" European-American women after they were established financially. The men entered into contracts with the mothers of the young women of color, promising support and sometimes education of their mixed-race children, as well as financial settlements.

At the time, Black women were not seen as worthy of religious life. DeLille had not been able to join an existing congregation due to these prejudices, and when she formed her own order, they were still not allowed to wear a habit. They were also made to take private rather than public vows. In 2010 Pope Benedict XVI declared DeLille to be Venerable.



Mother Mary Lange (1784 – 1882) Servant of God, was born Elizabeth Lange, a native of the Caribbean, and believed to be Cuban born of Haitian descent. She was the foundress and first Superior General of the Oblate Sisters of Providence (1829-1832), the first religious congregation of African American women in the history of the Catholic Church. On July 2, 1829, Elizabeth and three other women professed their vows and became the Oblate Sisters of Providence with the goal of educating and evangelizing African Americans. They educated youth and provided a home for orphans. Freed slaves were educated and at times admitted into the congregation. They nursed the terminally ill during the cholera epidemic of 1832, sheltered the elderly, and served as domestics at St. Mary's Seminary.

Mother Mary Lange practiced faith to an extraordinary degree. It was her deep faith – in close union with Jesus – which enabled her to persevere against all odds. She lived through disappointment and opposition until God called her

home at the St. Frances Convent in Baltimore, Maryland.

Julia Greeley (1833? – 1918) Servant of God, was born into slavery. Freed by Missouri's Emancipation Act in 1865, Julia subsequently earned her keep by serving white families in Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico—though mostly in the Denver area. Julia entered the Catholic Church at Sacred Heart Parish in Denver in 1880 and was an outstanding supporter of all the parish. The Jesuits who ran the parish considered her the most enthusiastic promoter of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus they had ever seen. Every month she visited on foot every fire station in Denver and delivered literature of the Sacred Heart League to the firemen, Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

A daily communicant, Julia had a rich devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Virgin and continued her prayers while working. She joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1901 and was active in it till her death. As part of the Cause for Canonization, Julia's mortal remains were transferred to Denver's Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception on June 7, 2017.






