Dear Friends,

These last weeks have been a season of extraordinary grace for St. James. On April 20, 21, and 22, our young people were confirmed in the Catholic faith and sealed with the Holy Spirit by Bishop Joseph Perry. This past weekend, around 170 of our children received their First Holy Communion. I sincerely hope and pray for all of them that this will be the start of a deep friendship with Jesus Christ.

As I was reflecting and praying about the mission of the Church recently, this is what the Lord revealed to me:

Philip immediately asks the Lord, "Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us." Jesus says to him, "Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father." Jesus thus reveals His union with the Father and His desire to share that union with us. There's only one way to reach that point; through Jesus.

Let's pray for our young people who are entering into adulthood. They need our prayers.

Babel-on No More

Join us for the 5:00 pm Pentecost Vigil Mass on Saturday, May 27

Many people don't realize that the word babel comes from the name of a city described in Genesis. In the biblical narrative, the people said:

"Come, let us build ourselves a city and a tower with its top in the sky, and so make a name for ourselves; otherwise, we shall be scattered all over the earth." The LORD came down to see the city and the tower that the people had built. Then the LORD said: If now, while they are one people and all have the same language, they have started to do this, nothing they presume to do will be out of their reach. Come, let us go down and there confuse their language, so that no one will understand the speech of another (Gen 11:4-5).

At a first glance, God's action in the story may sound unjust or cruel. What God did, however, was prevent the people's pride from leading them to destruction. In the spiritual life, pride is a deadly sin; for Satan, pride truly came before the fall. This sense of pride is defined as, "undue selfesteem or self-love, which seeks attention and honor and sets oneself in competition with God" (Glossary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church).

The Tower of Babel is a symbol of pride. Once people think they can do whatever they want without constraint, then inevitably, immoral choices are made. Today we seem more concerned if we are technologically capable of doing something without first asking if we should be doing it in the first place: human cloning, "transgender" surgery and hormonal prescriptions, biological warfare and so on.

The good news is that if the story of Babel represents the division of humanity along linguistic lines then Pentecost is its reversal. The Holy Spirit came upon the apostles and empowered them to speak the many languages spoken by the people gathered in Jerusalem. This is often described as the birth of the Catholic Church. The word "Catholic" itself is a transliteration of the Greek katolicos (Kαθoλik ς), meaning "universal." The Church invites all, Jews and gentiles, to be disciples of Jesus, members of God's people through baptism. This is why St. Peter "testified with many other arguments, and was exhorting them, 'Save yourselves from this corrupt generation.' Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand persons were added that day" (Acts 2:40-41).

Here at St. James, we will be celebrating Pentecost in a special way on Saturday, May 27. We will celebrate it as a vigil, with additional readings on what God has done for us, beginning with the story of the Tower of Babel.



No Longer Orphans

My dad was adopted as a baby. It's a big part of my family's story. His birth mother placed him in a Catholic orphanage not long after birth. A young couple longing for a baby strolled among the bassinets. My father, then only a few months old, looked at the husband and smiled. The man said, "That's my son." They took him home and the family grew. This moment of adoption was a wonderful truth they celebrated even when my dad was a young boy. They told him, "You're even more special than the other children, because we chose you to be our son." My dad's eyes well up with tears of gratitude whenever he tells the story, even eightythree years later.

What is your story? Do we think or act like unwanted orphans? Who do we believe ourselves to be? As we continue to ponder Jesus' resurrection, we hear him say to us this Sunday, "I will not leave you orphans." God doesn't leave us alone like spiritual orphans. The power that raised Jesus from the dead is the Holy Spirit, who is also called the Spirit of Adoption. He chooses us to be His children, to share God's life forever. He gives us a future filled with hope.

We are not orphans anymore! This Easter, that's the story we should share with others. It's the true story we are living right now.
